# Proposed Domestic Building Environmental Standards (Scotland) Bill

#### Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to introduce new minimum environmental design standards for all new-build housing to meet the Passivhaus standard or a Scottish equivalent in order to improve energy efficiency and thermal performance.

The consultation runs from 4 May 2022 to 27 July 2022

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill? Please note that this question is compulsory.

#### Please explain the reasons for your response.

Clearly, appropriate building standards bring many benefits in terms of energy consumption. Financial and social benefits are also applicable for those residing in housing which is constructed to the highest possible / reasonable standards in terms of energy consumption. These benefits can be defined as long and short term, and to my mind, the only way forward given the multiplicity of factors, and facts, related to this subject, is to tackle the issue head on, and an improvement in general domestic building standards, specific to energy efficiency to be encapsulated in legislation. Retrofitting is not a way forward, the clue is in the name, and in my experience, never compares favourably with integral standards being applied at time of new build.

Legislation with definitive standards and penalties for non compliance, is in my opinion, the only way forward.

#### Please explain the reasons for your response.

It cannot be argued, at this stage, that a specific standard will have a significant short or medium term impact eradicating fuel poverty. This is a highly complex issue. It will contribute, of that there is no doubt, but clearly this is a long(ish) term approach. If nothing is done now, then there will be zero contribution either in the short, medium or long term. As stated, this is a complex issue, and I have no intention of writing a paper on the subject!!! However, consider this....fuel poverty is mentioned in this question, almost every definition of fuel poverty I have seen, bears a reference to 10 p.c. of household income being spent on "fuel", being one defining factor of fuel poverty. However, I can tell you from experience, that people in Scotland suffer daily, particulary in the colder months, scrimping and saving, wandering around indoors with multiple layers of clothing. In some cases living in one room, or indeed staying in bed, in an effort to save on fuel costs. The consequences of these actions and the miserable existence related to these actions, and indeed the purpose of these actions is a saving on fuel costs. That saving, may result in less than 10 p.c. of household income being spent on fuel!!! Albeit that for some people, depending on health, this is a high risk strategy, they may in fact be moving themselves out of one of the key factors in defining fuel poverty. The reality is, that they could be means tested on what fuel they are using, as opposed to what they should be using to maintain a healthy and meaningful existence. This example is one of many complex factors, and I use it only as an example in supporting my case that yes, surely building standards will contribute greatly, but I can only be partially supportive in terms of expressing my support in terms of the words used in #3 above.

This needs to be considered, and acted upon, otherwise we are "going nowhere" as a Nation in terms of a postive approach on such issues.
